





Course Outline

In this course, we will explore the important issues of an interconnected global world--such as inequality, cultural hegemony, global warming, and population problems, as well as religious, ethnic, and racial conflicts--through the lenses of sociological concepts. Students will be introduced to major theoretical perspectives, as well as key concepts, such as culture, socialization, and social interaction, all of which guide the practice of sociology. Students will also come to explore the benefits of employing a sociological imagination which is an ability to connect personal experiences to broader social and historical contexts.

This course studies globalization and global capitalism not from the economic but sociological perspectives. The course brings to the fore the issues of international financial institutions, global governance, development, neoliberalism, global inequality, migration, social movements, social reproduction, gender, environment, race, and citizenship. This course focuses on Asia as its geographic focus and the various ways in which globalization has benefited and hurt different countries in the region. This course motivates students to think critically about the effects of globalization and the consequences of macro-level changes at a micro-level and to reflect on how the global structure manifests in local sites, especially in their own daily lives.

Is studying labor relevant in the 21st Century? This course finds the answer by focusing on South Korea's social transformation from the 1970s to the 1990s with the labor uprisings of 1987 as the milestone event. This course adopts studies of organized labor in South Korea as a lens to understand South Korea's post-war development and democratization. By paying attention to gender, class consciousness, social movements, and development, this course studies the formation of South Korea's working class in the past as a way of studying the present and discusses the future of labor in South Korea and elsewhere in the context of globalization, technological development, and other social changes of this century.

With a growing international profile, Daegu prides itself on hosting various international events. These have included the IAAF (World Athletics) World Championships in 2011, the World Water Forum in 2015, and the Culture City of East Asia program in 2017. Yearly festivals emphasize both international and Korean themes. These include the Daegu International Music Festival (June-October), Colorful Daegu Festival (May), Daegu Overseas Chinese Cultural Festival (October), Daegu Yangyeongsi Herb Medicine Festival (May), Daegu International Opera Festival (October), Daegu Chimac (chicken and beer) Festival (July), and Daegu International Bodypainting Festival (August). Daegu is also home to the region's largest traditional and new night market (Seomun Market).

Learning about traditional culture of various flavors, including Confucianism and Buddhism, is within easy grasp in Daegu through several area academies and temples, including the beautiful Dongwhasa complex on Mt. Palgong. Korea's patriotic history comes alive at many memorials, such as the downtown Gukchae-bosang Memorial Park. Downtown also features a traditional Korean herbal medicine market, along with many early churches that highlight Korea's Christian history. Daegu is the original home of Samsung Corporation and continues its innovative industrial heritage today through robotics, medicine, and IoT, among other industries. Gyeongju, historically known as Seorabeol, is a coastal city in the far southeastern corner of North Gyeongsang Province in South Korea. It is the second largest city by area in the province after Andong, covering 1,324 km² with a population of 264,091 people.
